THE WORD

'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends if you do what I command you.' John 15:12-14

Dear Friends and Members of Emmanuel Church,

The older I get the more I appreciate the value of friendship. When you're young, you take friendship for granted. After all, you have a steady flow of friends at school that you see every day. You play with them on the playground or ride bikes with them or build forts in the woods.

As you age, you become more discriminating about friendship. Friendship depends more on being available for people—and the workaday world means I have 'friends' that I never talk to or see. Sometimes, people drift apart—friends don't share values or they have kids and we don't or they like to go on cruises and we like to tour national parks. Moreover, a rough reality of the world is that sometimes, unfortunately, relationships break down and friendships become broken.

Yet, Jesus has a very different model of friendship! He commands us to love one another and we are to be friends with one another. (Question: Can you really command someone to be friends with someone else? To love someone else? No matter how you answer, Jesus seemed to think so!) On the one hand, I love this model of friendship. It's so simple—love one another. On the other, if this is such a good model, why don't we see an abundance true friendship and love in our world?

A few months ago, I found out about a model of friendship that has influenced the modern Christian church, primarily in England. It is called 'double-listening.' Double listening begins with an attempt to really understand, love, care for the other person, even if (or especially if) they don't share your religion, worldview, culture, values. Then, and only then, we can bring in our understanding of religion, and Jesus Christ, and our own understandings of how the world works. It appears to me that this model is key and works very well with Jesus' example in John 15.

Love means to really care for someone. Not to care for them only until we interrupt with our 'better' story. People in our world want to hear that they are understood. They want to see they are understood. Jesus has placed us in this world to do these very things. No greater love . . .

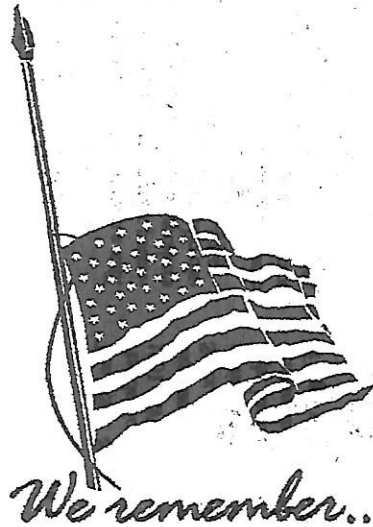
The Recipe Corner



Chicken Ball

- 1 13 oz. can premium chicken, drained
- 8 oz. 1/3 less fat cream cheese
- 2 tablespoons light mayo
- 2 teaspoons less sodium soy sauce
- 1 cup chopped nuts (pecans work well)

In medium bowl, blend chicken, cream cheese, mayo and soy sauce with a mixer. Refrigerate overnight or for at least 2-3 hours. Mixture should be stiff. Place nuts in a separate medium bowl. Using a spatula, scrape the chicken mixture out into your hands and form into a large ball. Once formed, roll the ball carefully in the nuts, covering all sides and using all the nuts. Place the ball on a plate and serve with crackers of your choice. Serves 4-6.



PATRIOT DAY

In the United States, Patriot Day occurs on September 11 of each year, designated in memory of the 2,993 killed in the September 11, 2001 attacks. Most Americans refer to the day as "Nine-Eleven (9/11)," "September Eleventh," or some variation thereof.

U.S. House of Representatives Joint Resolution 71 was approved by a vote of 407-0 on October 25, 2001. It requested that the President designate September 11 of each year as "Patriot Day." President George W. Bush signed the resolution into law on December 18, 2001 (as Public Law 107-89). It is a discretionary day of remembrance.

Initially, the day was called the Prayer and Remembrance for the Victims of the Terrorist Attacks on September 11, 2001.

On September 4, 2002, President Bush used his authority created by the resolution and proclaimed September 11, 2002 as Patriot Day.

On this day, the President directs that the American flag be flown at half-staff at individual American homes, at the White House, and on all U.S. government buildings and establishments, home and abroad. The President also asks Americans to observe a moment of silence beginning at 8:46 A.M. (Eastern Daylight Time), the time of the first plane crash on September 11, 2001.

Labor Day in the United States is a holiday celebrated on the first Monday in September. It is a celebration of the American labor movement and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of workers. It constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of their country.

Labor Day was promoted by the Central Labor Union and the Knights of Labor, who organized the first parade in New York City. After the Haymarket Massacre, which occurred in Chicago on May 4, 1886, U.S. President Grover Cleveland feared that commemorating Labor Day on May 1 could become an opportunity to commemorate the affair. Thus, in 1887, it was established as an official holiday in September to support the Labor Day that the Knights favored.^[1]

The equivalent holiday in Canada, Labour Day, is also celebrated on the first Monday of September. In many other countries (more than 80 worldwide), "Labour Day" is synonymous with, or linked with, International Workers' Day, which occurs on May 1.

History

In 1882, Matthew Maguire, a machinist, first proposed the holiday while serving as secretary of the CLU (Central Labor Union) of New York.^[2] Others argue that it was first proposed by Peter J. McGuire of the American Federation of Labor in May 1882,^[3] after witnessing the annual labour festival held in Toronto, Canada.^[4] Oregon was the first state to make it a holiday on February 21, 1887. By the time it became a federal holiday in 1894, thirty states officially celebrated Labor Day.^[3]

Following the deaths of a number of workers at the hands of the U.S. military and U.S. Marshals during the Pullman Strike, the United States Congress unanimously voted to approve rush legislation that made Labor Day a national holiday; President Grover Cleveland signed it into law a mere six days after the end of the strike.^[5] The September date originally chosen by the CLU of New York and observed by many of the nation's trade unions for the past several years was selected rather than the more widespread International Workers' Day because Cleveland was concerned that observance of the latter would be associated with the nascent Communist, Syndicalist and Anarchist movements that, though distinct from one another, had rallied to commemorate the Haymarket Affair in International Workers' Day.^[6] All U.S. states, the District of Columbia, and the territories have made it a statutory holiday.

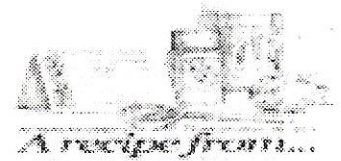
End of summer

Labor Day has come to be celebrated by most Americans as the symbolic end of the summer. In high society, Labor Day is (or was) considered the last day of the year when it is fashionable to wear white^[9] or seersucker.^{[10][11]}

In U.S. sports, Labor Day marks the beginning of the NFL and college football seasons. NCAA teams usually play their first games the weekend of Labor Day, with the NFL traditionally playing their first game the Thursday following Labor Day. The Southern 500 NASCAR auto race was held that day from 1950 to 1983 in Darlington, South Carolina. At Indianapolis Raceway Park, the National Hot Rod Association hold their finals to the U.S. Nationals drag race. Labor Day is the middle point between weeks 1 and 2 of the U.S. Open Tennis Championships held in Flushing Meadows, New York.

In the United States, most school districts resume classes around the Labor Day holiday weekend (see First Day of School). Most begin the week before, making Labor Day weekend the first three-day weekend of the school calendar. While others return the Tuesday following Labor Day, allowing families one final get away before the school year begins. Many districts across the Midwest are opting to begin school after Labor Day.^[12]

Fish Reuben

1 pound flounder or sole fillets
1 can (8oz.) sauerkraut, well drained
4 mushrooms, sliced
2 slices swiss cheese, cut into strips
2 Kosher dill pickle spears, split lengthwise
Paprika
Lemon wedge

Wash and pat fish fillets dry with paper towels. Place sauerkraut, sliced mushrooms, swiss cheese and pickle spear on fish fillet. Roll, jelly-roll fashion: secure with Toothpicks. Place in baking dish (10" x 6" x 1 1/2"), Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in 350 degree oven, 20 to 25 minutes or until fish flakes easily with fork. Remove toothpicks before serving. Serve with fresh Lemon wedges. Makes 2 servings.
