# The Recipe Corner



### Squash and Kale One Pot Pasta

12 oz. whole wheat rotini
3 cloves garlic, minced
16 oz. peeled and cubed butternut squash
4 oz. Kale, chopped
1 1/2 tbsp. dried thyme
1/4 cup olive oil, divided
Salt and Pepper
1 cup grated parmesan cheese

Cook pasta in a large pot of salted water, according to package directions. Drain, reserving 2 cups of pasta water. Put pasta water back in pot and add garlic, squash, Kale, thyme and 2 tbsp. olive oil. Season with salt and pepper. Bring to a boil then reduce to a simmer, Stirring frequently until squash is tender, about 10 minutes. Add pasta to vegetables and raise heat to medium. Drizzle with 2 tbsp. olive oil, stir to combine and cook another 5 minutes. Serve topped with cheese. Serves 6.

### January

The children talked about the hard times Mary and Joseph faced on their journey to Bethlehem. We tried to imagine the conditions they found themselves in during the birth of Jesus. Next we learned about the temptation of Jesus. After his own baptism Jesus went into the wilderness for 40 days, where Satan tried to tempt him to show he was the son of God. Jesus stayed strong and was able to stick to his will. Next the children learned about Jesus's first preaching from a scroll at the synagogue. He was there to spread the word of his father, God. We held a messy church on the," ringing of the bells. "The attendance for this was great, especially by the adults! Lots of laughs too!

### February

Cherish God's name because it is holy and worth holding His name to a higher standard. Then we discussed that no matter where we go or what we do God and Jesus will always be there. All we have to do is look to them for our strength and guidance. We had a messy church with the theme, "paints of many colors." We had a nice size turn out with 9 children and lots of adults.

### April

The children heard the story of Palm Sunday. We discussed that we can ask God for forgiveness at times of sin, in order to clean us on the inside. Next the children celebrated Easter by hearing a butterfly story about Jesus's resurrection. Then the children heard the story about a man named Zacchaeus who was up in a tree. Our messy church this month was on "Noah's Ark." Everyone loved the boat display on the stage with all the stuffed animals. Our attendance again was mainly adults with lots of conversations.

May

The children listened to the three messianic messages in Daniel, Isiah, and Zechariah foretelling of Jesus' coming. They were shocked to learn that they all spoke about one person, Jesus! Then the children discussed the dynamics of a family. We talked about why our families are so important to us. Then the children listened to the story of Jesus being crucified. We also had our annual trip to a Pirates game with perfect seats for the fireworks after.

### June

We had our annual Vacation Bible School. Our Lego theme was very well received. We had 16 children sign up with 4 extra visitors during the last two nights. Walmart gave us a 25.00 gift card, which was used to purchase Lego's to make crafts with. Lego donated boats and the legs of our Lego people. Pastor and Jennifer supplied all of the snacks. The church provided the pizza for the family party. Logan and I donated the rest of the Lego people from Lego, the ores for the boats, and our Lego banner. Amanda donated the use of her Lego's from work for the children to build with and also her teaching time! Next we celebrated our homecoming the children talked about the different building blocks that make up the church. Without all of the pieces we wouldn't be here. We discussed our history and what it was like when we were first formed 197 years ago. We also discussed what we think it would be like in the future.

### July

God gives us instructions, which sometimes makes us uncomfortable. However we should obey these instructions no matter what because God knows who needs our help. Then the children listened to a message from Paul. We should have the same mind and heart as Jesus. God is with us, enabling us to do good will towards others. Next we witnessed a baptism and talked about what it means and why we do it. Then the children listened to the covenant given to Noah from God after the flood. They learned this covenant was a Royal Grant from God not requiring anything from the people or animals on Earth for God to keep this covenant.

### August

The children discussed John 1; In the beginning, the Word was with God and the Word was God. At the end of the month we celebrated with our annual Trick or Treat/ Messy Church. This years theme was Ezekiel 37 and the dry bones. We had a great turn out, a lot of participation, as well as wonderful weather!

### November

We talked about the miracle where Jesus fed the 5000 with five loafs of bread and two fishes. More important, we focused on the little boy who gave up his food for everyone. No matter how small you are, how unimportant you feel, or how little of a difference you think you make; your actions are more influential than you could ever imagine. The children learned about a cornucopia, or horn of plenty as it was known in the times of the first settlers in our great nation. Not just during this time of year, but everyday we should give thanks to God and Jesus for all that we have and all the gifts we receive. The children listened to a story about sheeps and goats. Sheep helped one another. They led others to the water and pastures for food. However the Goats were not as nice and wouldn't help one another.

### December

They listened to the message the Angel Gabriel brought to the virgin Mary in chapter 1 of Luke. We discussed what the advent wreath represents and what the candles represent. We held our first Polar Pj Party! The night seemed to be a hit with the children who attended. The parents loved the set up and how cozy it seemed with the Christmas lights. We were able to receive a pizza donation from Momma P's in Delmont. Amanda and Rob donated party ware, pizza delivery, as well as their time and help at the event. Hot chocolate, marshmallows, candy canes, crafts and decorations were donated by my family. We asked for donations instead of setting a price and raised \$10.00. Next year we will be making some changes by setting a small price per child, an age requirement, as well as changing the time frame. For Christmas Eve In the morning the children had the chance to take turns reading the story "The Legend of the Candy Cane" to the congregation. During the reading our younger children passed out candy canes with a poem attached. For our annual evening service the children, members, and visitors placed ornaments/symbols on our Jesse Tree. The children also performed two songs.
